THE CHURCH AS A LAUNCHING PLACE

Three years ago, on a Sunday I had off from my usual pastoral duties, my wife and I visited the church where our neighbors attend. It is not far from our home and I would drive by it often. It's a lovely church and very active. The church has a solid, good reputation in the community. It has many members with many connections, a large and impressive church. And my neighbors are wonderful.

The Sunday we visited, we entered the well-furnished gathering area. Our neighbors were greeters that day and welcomed us with happy surprise. We spoke a few pleasantries, but they had their task and went on to greet the next coming in. I noticed that they spent more time talking with their friends who were next in line.

We looked around for the entrance to the worship space. No one else came up to greet us. No one took us to the coffee and refreshments. No one offered to escort us to the worship area. No one introduced us to their worship protocol or hymnal. Afterward, while others chatted with friends, we were left to guess what to do. So we left. We have not been back.

OUR SHARED "YEAR AWAY"

One of the most influential years of my life was spent as an exchange student in Billund, Denmark during my senior year of high school. It was a complete "immersion" experience. I didn't know a lick of Danish when I boarded a plane that would take me from Minneapolis to Copenhagen.

Those first few months were difficult. I look back on my journal entries and what I speak about mostly is how everything was new. A new language. A new culture. A new daily routine with my host families.

When I think back on this past year that we have shared as a people of Roseville Lutheran, I would have to admit, there have been a lot of new learning opportunities as we learned new ways of being Christ's people in the world.



- We have learned a new language of pandemic and vaccines (Interestingly enough, NPR recently wrote a story that the pandemic inspired 1200 new words in the German language! https://www.npr.org/2021/03/06/974179580/pandemic-inspires-more-than-1-200-new-german-words)
- We have learned a new culture. A culture where we we're socially distanced, masked and 6-feet apart.
- We have learned new ways of how to speak of Christ's hope, mercy, grace and love.

Yes, we have been apart – but we have also grown in so many ways! You, the people of Roseville Lutheran Church, continue to inspire and encourage me. From those first early days of the pandemic where we were collecting food and resources for people who were in need, to the creative ways you have lived out your calling as children of God in your own neighborhoods and places of work and study. You have embraced the hard work of learning new words to speak about race and justice. You have taken Bible studies online, engaged in online and outdoor worship, and helped us celebrate our successful pRAISE campaign! Thank you! (See some great pictures on p. 5-7)

THINGS HAVE CHANGED

When I was an exchange student, I always knew I would be coming home. The place where I was living in Denmark was only a temporary place in my life. And, I'll be honest with you, re-entry was hard! I had changed. My family had changed. My friends had changed. There were so many things I wanted to share. So many things I had also missed.

I've been thinking, recently, about how this year of pandemic has in many ways been like a shared experience of one shared "year away."

When we return to in-person worship, education, ministries and activities, all of us are coming with the experiences of the past year – and, I do believe, that re-entry will be a unique time for the ministry of RLC. We have all learned a new language. A language of longing. A language of loss. A language of hope. A language of resiliency. We have also learned a new culture of how to be "the church" while we haven't been able to gather in physical community.

We have all changed. The world has changed. Our families have changed. Our congregation has changed.

- We have experienced the death of some of our members.
- We have greeted the birth of new children and rejoiced in their baptisms.
- We have seen two graduating classes of seniors set off on their journeys and two confirmation classes rejoice in their baptisms.

Churches today are at a decision moment. Attraction no longer is an effective evangelism method (and most congregations have lost the art of hospitality). Being a large, pretty church is not enough to "bring in new members." Being nice, wonderful people is not enough. Current generations are expecting more. God is expecting more.

The very last instructions Jesus gives to his followers in the Gospel According to Matthew is, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations..." The direction is outward. The sense is "as you go about your

life in the world, make disciples." The church's purpose occurs as it interacts with the community beyond its members. The main work of the church happens outside the building.



The Constitution and Bylaws Task Force has completed a draft of updates for council review and congregation amendment. The updates will be brought to RLC members this early fall. The one area still uncertain is how RLC should be organized for ministry. A church organized around activities depending on "attraction," no longer works. It is not yet clear how bylaws should be written to structure a church "sent," a church in this new era existing for the sake of those beyond our membership.



The Ministry Site Profile Task Force is nearing completion of its work on describing RLC's near future and what role the next Associate Pastor will have in it. The larger question for the task force has been the nature of RLC's purpose and place in a world where attraction evangelism no longer works.

LGBTQ+ INCLUSION TASK FORCE

The Inclusion Task Force has begun exploring the place of LGBTQ+ in this congregation. An "attraction model" of evangelism has always been about who gets to be "attracted." The task force's question is whether RLC is a church also for queer folk.

The church of first century Christians did not have a building dedicated for worship and programs. It was a church sent into communities where ordinary people lived by different rules than the prevailing culture, a way of life that blessed and honored and made safe places for everyone to be. RLC is at a decision moment of how to effectively "love God and love your neighbor" in a changed world. The church of the future will no longer be so much a gathering place but that of a *launching place*.

A special congregational meeting will then be called for the congregation to approve the draft document. Further communication will be forthcoming on when the draft will be available for Congregation review.

Once the congregation approves the draft document, it is sent to the St Paul Area Synod for approval. Also, a Summary of Changes document will be available online and in hardcopy.



STRENGTH FOR TODAY. BRIGHT HOPE FOR TOMORROW.

OUR NEIGHBORS AND ME (ONAM)

Racial Justice at Roseville Lutheran Church



The past year has been filled with great turmoil as both political and racial unrest shook our communities and our nation. RLC's mission to "Love God • Love Your Neighbor" has taken on a new urgency as we try to build a more just and inclusive society right here in the Twin Cities. The ONAM Committee is planning to address these important issues in their upcoming fall programs.

In her book, "Me and White Supremacy," Layla F. Saad lays out the importance of educating yourself about what "white supremacy" actually means. Most Americans see it as a far right, neo-Nazi fringe designation. But, in fact, the phrase refers to an entire set of beliefs which posit the superiority of the white race and which are still perpetuated today to the detriment of people of color. Saad calls us to combat racist ideology as a path to becoming what she calls a "good ancestor" – a human being who works to leave the world a better place for those who come.

In September, ONAM will offer a four session class centered on Saad's 2020 book, which lays out a month-long program of self-examination, reading, journaling and discussion – all of which ask the participants to consider how their racial conditioning has impacted them. These groups will meet on Sunday mornings on the following dates: **September 12, 19, 26, and October 10**. Small group leaders will be Alice Neve and Marilyn Shardlow, and registration is limited to 20 participants.

ONAM will also be welcoming back Dr. Karen McKinney, Chief Equity Officer at the MN Department of Human Services, a familiar guest at RLC. Her first presentation on **Monday, September 20**, will focus on the Biblical underpinnings of white supremacist ideology and the second on **Monday, September 27** on how Roseville Lutheran can become an actively anti-racist congregation. Pre-registration will be offered in August. Dr. McKinney is a former Professor of Theology at Bethel University and has been an important resource for ONAM during the past five years.

ONAM is also sponsoring an event on **Saturday, October 2**, called the **Sacred Sites Tour**, which is sponsored by a local Native American organization called *Healing Stories*. With the knowledge that in many cases mistreatment of Native peoples was accomplished with the full participation of white religious institutions, *Healing Stories* brings together various groups to spread knowledge of indigenous histories and to build hope and healing for their futures. Led by local indigenous leaders, Mr. James Big Bear (Mohican) and Bob Klanderud (Dakota), it will focus on the significance of the area around the confluence of the Mississippi and Minnesota Rivers. This event is open to 40-45 people and will require preregistration. The coordinator of this event is Heather Awad.

RECENT BOOKS ON ANTI-RACISM TO READ THIS SUMMER...

FAMILY RETREAT ON LAKE VERMILLION


October 22-24 in God's Great North Woods


