The New RLC Stewardship

Committee

A little over a year ago, a Fundraising Task-force was commissioned by the Roseville Lutheran Church (RLC) council, with the purpose of looking at the state of RLC's giving and providing a recommendation to the council that would outline how to apply our resources, both staff and volunteer, to ensure the long-term financial health of the congregation.

While several recommendations were ultimately made to the council, the most basic of these, and perhaps the most important, was the recommendation to reestablish a Stewardship Committee, which has been nonexistent at RLC for more than 5 years. And so, a new Stewardship Committee was officially formed this past summer and has been actively meeting for the past few months.

The mission of the Stewardship Committee is to foster awareness, within our congregation, of God's abundant blessings in the gifts He has given each of us. We also aim to encourage and enable our members to respond to God's love by sharing these gifts of time, talent and treasures, and to embrace the call to return to God, what is God's.

As a new committee, we are still establishing our long-term goals, but so far, we have identified the following guiding principles that we will be working to achieve in the coming months and years.

• Change perceptions about church stewardship: "Stewardship calls for integration between our faith and the way we live our lives" – Grace Duddy, "Stewards of God's Love."

Coming up: Family Serve Sunday - Serving Sandwiches on February 8

We have another amazing opportunity at Roseville Lutheran Church to help our most needy. This February, families with kids of all ages will participate in making 1,000 sandwiches to give to area homeless through 363 Days Food Program. Allan Law began feeding homeless and families in need on a daily basis in 1999. Mr. Law goes out every evening from 9:00 p.m.–5:00 a.m. to deliver sandwiches. He distributes an average of 1,600 sandwiches a night to individuals, shelters and locations serving the homeless. In addition, Allan distributes sandwiches that provide an extra meal for overnight residents to ten Twin Cities partner organizations serving the homeless and poor in Minneapolis and St Paul.

We will gather in the Activity Center at 10:10 a.m. for a short presentation and then begin assembling sandwiches. Families of all shapes and sizes are invited to participate in this event. Last year we made 1,000 sandwiches in less than 20 minutes!

What Is *Consecration*?

Much of what we do in this life is mundane. To most people, doing laundry or mowing the lawn or paying the bills is pretty ordinary stuff. But certain things rise to the level of special, extraordinary, exceptional. The birth of a child ought never be mundane, or the vows in marriage, or the service of baptism, or the partaking of communion. These things are, indeed, special. Some would call them "holy."

Whenever God consecrates something in our lives, he makes them holy. God might consecrate a worship space, and then it becomes more than just four walls. God might consecrate a missionary, and then she becomes fit for holy work. But can you ever imagine God consecrating your money? Making it more than a mundane exchange for a pizza or a gallon of gas? But here is a truth: when we give money to the mission of God in the world, it becomes holy money. God consecrates it and gives it special Lutheran Church do more than pay the light bill or purpose, far beyond what we could ever plan. God takes our dollars and through them, changes lives, brings healing, provides hope, and translates it into love in action.

Who knew our gifts could do so much? God knew, and that's why God calls us to be partners in mission to a world in need. Of course, this is also true when we share our talents, and give of our time to God's work. It, too, becomes holy.

Three bricklayers were busy on the construction site of a new church. When a visitor asked what they were doing, each had a different perspective. One grumbled, "I'm laying bricks." A second answered, "I'm building a wall." The third joyfully said, "I'm building the Kingdom of God." Holy work.

New Consecration Sunday brings us face to face with a God of grace, taking our generous intentions and turning them into holy activity . . . activity that will last for eternity. Our gifts to Roseville become part of the church budget. The decision to share these gifts becomes a tangible, concrete expression of our love for the Savior. The same thing happens when we teach a Cornerstone class, or play bells, or rake our neighbor's lawn, or buy a sandwich for a hungry man. The ordinary becomes holy.

So, it is with humility that I ask you to join others and me on the weekend of November 15-16, as we invite God to consecrate a portion of our financial blessings. All of this will be done with joy and gratitude, because the greatest example of consecration is that God has made us holy. Everything else is our grateful response.

President's Message

It's exciting to see a new program year begin again at Roseville Lutheran - the year of Go! Our RLC calendar is full of ways you can get involved in whatever way is right for you. Your 2014/2015 Council is also off running! Here are some highlights:

If you attended this year's annual meeting in June, then you know we shared information about significant facilities maintenance issues and continued budget shortfalls that need to be addressed. In August we formed a task force made up of current ministry chairs, past council members and others that have been involved in various aspects of RLC's ministry. In selecting this group we were looking for individuals with diverse perspectives, and experience with a specific part of RLC's mission. Their purpose was to look into these issues and then provide Council their thinking on how to tackle these challenges. Council was given the task force's recommendation at our October meeting, and we are now in the process of considering those recommendations, and also how to share their thinking with all of you.

On Sunday, October 12th we asked the con-

gregation to vote on whether we should sell a piece of property purchased in 1988, in anticipation of our then future growth plans for a new sanctuary. The property has never been used for any ministry purposes and we have had expenses associated with the property over the past 26 years. Recently, an interested buyer approached us with a reasonable offer and Council decided to put it to a vote, per a special congregational meeting. The 135 members attending the meeting voted to sell the property with 98% voting yes. We have not yet determined how these funds will be used, except that they will be used toward addressing our budget and/or maintenance issues.

I would also like to highlight our Stewardship focus this year. I hope you are able to attend Consecration Weekend on November 15th and 16th – both worship and a special meal following each service. Consecration Weekend is a spiritual-growth-oriented experience to enrich our biblical understanding of what it means to be a Christian steward. I hope you will join with other members and friends of Roseville Lutheran for this special weekend.

In November Pastor Steve will also be offering a 10:10 program about calling our new pastor. Please come and hear more about that process which we plan to start early next year. There will be some preliminary work beginning in January, and then we hope to appoint a call committee by early spring.

Many of you are already very involved in the ministry of RLC. Thank you for you all you do to make RLC special. If you are not involved, I encourage you to find some way to get more involved. Maybe it's helping with Cornerstone, or greeting your fellow worshippers before your service, or helping out in the kitchen. Check out the Serve Board in the Commons area for ideas. Whatever it is, I think you will meet some great people and hopefully have some fun too!

Go Further with Welcome Ministry

The Welcome Ministry is for those who want to help new people, as well as regular attendees, feel at home, comfortable, and welcome at RLC. I personally wish to encourage you and your family to consider taking part in one or more of the ministry areas mentioned below as part of your year of Serve! Most positions require very little time outside the regular worship experience and in most cases you would be part of a team, from whom you would receive support and training. And, as you'll see in the following descriptions, the time commitment maybe as little as a 1-2 times a year. Lay persons such as you can make new Christian friends, provide much-needed assistance, serve your church and your God, and get to know RLC on a more personal level.

Extend a hand in greeting people as they arrive before each worship time. A friendly smile can make a world of difference to those coming through the doors, especially those who are visiting. Families and couples can greet together.

- Usher before and during worship, handing out worship folders and helping with communion and offering. Ushers usually help on a rotating basis a month at a time three different months of the year. Ushers are needed for; 5 p.m., 9 a.m., and 11 a.m. worship.
- Serve on the altar guild, preparing the wine and wafer trays. Candles are also maintained by this group. These helpers usually serve a month at a time usually 1-2 times a year. Communion trays are prepared on Saturday mornings before the first and third Sundays of the month.
- Help at the Welcome Desk (information desk) in Luther Commons, providing information to those with questions or handing out and

retrieving hearing assist devices. Helping in this area, you will quickly learn about the varied activities at RLC. (You don't have to know all the answers but rather need to connect the person to the most appropriate source of information.) And helping those to hear the Good News with our hearing assist devices is always rewarding.

- Help run power point during 11 a.m. worship. No experience necessary.
- Serve communion on Saturday at 5 p.m. or Sunday at 9 a.m. or 11 a.m. worship. Servers usually help about once every three months.
- Drive the bus to bring people to and from the 9am worship service or Wednesday morning Bible Study or Prime Time. No special driving license required, just as friendly attitude and a willingness to help people on and off the bus. A clean driving record is a must.

Roseville Lutheran Church in Transition




Finance Office

The budgeted year-to-date deficit is \$18,146, meaning we are \$21,905 below our expected position at the end of the first quarter of the fiscal year. Text to Give at RLC - Fast, Easy, and Secure

Send a text to 28950 with the message "RLC 5" to give \$5

Want to give to RLC, but aren't carrying any cash? You're not alone! But now, you can use your mobile phone to text in your offering to RLC! It's called 'Text to Give', and Pastor Steve has already been talking about this new and exciting service for the last few weeks in church. Text to Give is safe, secure and very easy to use. You will always receive an instant receipt directly to your phone letting you

know your gift has been received. All methods of giving (envelope, checks, Simply Giving, online giving, and now Text to Give) will be documented on your RLC giving statement.

The first time you use Text to Give you will need your credit/debit card to set up your personal information. Enter 28950 in the "To:" line of your text, type "RLC 5" on the message line, and then hit

'send'. "RLC" is Roseville Lutheran's unique giving code, and the 5 represents a \$5 donation amount (but you can enter any amount you want). Then follow the instructions to get set up. Go online to the Roseville Lutheran website to learn more.

Consecration Weekend is Coming

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Our congregation's stewardship committee has selected the New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of dis-

cipleship. New Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During worship on Consecration Weekend, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world.

Every attendee and member who completes an Intent to Give Card does so voluntarily by attending worship on Consecration Weekend. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During worship our guest leader will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We will encourage participation in Consecration Weekend events through the Consecration Weekend team, the Stewardship Committee and Church Council. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Weekend worship.

Thanks in advance for your enthusiastic participation in Consecration Weekend events.

Save 10%, Share 10%, Spend the Rest with Thanksgiving and Joy

My relationship with money was complicated. I was poor growing up, and though our home was filled with love and my parents provided all they could, I was aware that the bank balance drove all decisions. In high school, as I planned for the future, my only goal was to become financially secure. It wasn't the most poetic of life dreams, but I am nothing if not practical.

I found a secure job that allowed me do most things I wanted. For many years, my husband and I were DINKs: dual income, no kids. When it came time to add a house and children, we were able to grow into these expenses. I had achieved my childhood goal, but I had no satisfaction in it. Every time I purchased a want, like a nice watch, I felt guilty. For needs, like a new furnace, I worried if I had gotten the best deal. During vacations I felt stressed by the running tally of expenses in my head. Spending money was painful: I was surrounded by abundance, financial and otherwise, and yet I only worried about not having enough.

Several years ago, my husband and I joined an RLC Small Group reading It All Goes Back in the Box by John Ortberg, which challenged me to think about my whole life as a gift from God. During those discussions, a group member shared this insight: save 10%, share 10%, and spend the rest with thanksgiving and joy. Coincidentally, we had begun working with a financial planner who challenged us to be responsible stewards and think about our impact in the world.

Our financial planner coached us to set up monthly withdrawals for financial gift commitments, to simplify giving and integrate it into our lives. We chose a couple of organizations and gift amounts we felt we could realistically afford to give away. We had to repay some debt and to save an emergency fund, so we needed to find a healthy balance. The amounts were small and comparable to what we spent at coffee shops, fast food places, or movie theaters. Initially, the dollar amount we gave didn't matter; it was making the commitment to give regularly. Several years into this plan, tithing has become our long-term goal. We are still not comfortable with committing a full 10%, but we are committed to getting a little closer very year. Our gifts go to RLC and to several secular non-profits. Each year we ask ourselves if we can do more, and each year we are grateful to be able to say yes and get closer to our tithing goal.

I am most grateful to this process for the personal change I have had in my life. When asked to share my time, talent, or treasure, I feel like I have the internal resources to say yes. I have started volunteering, and this has brought me great enjoyment, new friendships, and insight to the great work being done; all of these things make me even more excited about my contributions. I am also comfortable setting boundaries and saying no if needed, because I have a plan to grow my giving. Seeing my financial gifts on my monthly statements along with my other expenses reminds me that I am a committed steward. I choose to help RLC in its stewardship ministry because I see the transformation in people who choose to be become responsible stewards: they lead lives of abundance and generosity, which are incredibly transforma-

My relationship with money is now simple: I am called to try to save 10%, to try to give 10%, and, finally, I can spend the rest with thanksgiving and joy.

Tithing: The Law? Really?

Perhaps you have heard of the word "tithe." Literally, it means "10%." In the Old Testament, all who raised cattle or grew crops were required to bring 10% to the storehouse, to aid the less fortunate. And ten percent was just the beginning. If a person chose, they could give more, and that was called "an offering." This is where we get the phrase tithes and offerings.

However, in the New Testament, Jesus seems to change that expectation. For some people, the tithe was deemed too much. For others, it seems, the tithe was not enough! So Jesus establishes a new standard: It all belongs to God! (Suddenly, ten percent doesn't seem so harsh!). God allows us to use that which belongs to him. God no longer just cares about what we do with 10%; God cares about what we do with all of it.

So now, the question changes: It is no lon-

ger what you are required to give, but rather, what is God calling you to give to the work of the Kingdom? Does your level of giving reflect your level of gratitude?

When I was young, I reasoned that I had very little income so I didn't give anything. But in my mind, that didn't feel right. As I started giving, I felt good about it. As I began to earn a larger salary, my giving increased proportionately.

So what about you? Do you feel good about the gifts you give to Kingdom work?

Is there room to grow?

Stewardship Highlight: Care Team Ministry

Naomi Miller and Ken Groth lead the Care Team Ministry at RLC. Care Team Ministry is a volunteer-led and -run ministry that responds, free of charge, to the non-medical "quality of life" needs of individuals and families of all ages to those within and around a faith community. It provides an opportunity for people to live their faith by serving others.

I spoke to Naomi and Ken after they had met with a new Partner joining the program to learn more about the Care Team Ministry and their experiences volunteering in this ministry area

Why do you participate in the Care Team Ministry?

Naomi: I really enjoy helping people. I feel like I have been blessed and I want to give back. I think of the verse, "to whom much is given, much will be required." (Luke 12:48). Especially as I get older, and I consider if I may need this help in the future, it is a way to pay this forward. But the Care Team not only helps older people; we have also supported people who have needed help for short periods: new mothers or people recovering post-surgery.

Ken: I think many people on the Care Team join because want to give back and they feel blessed to give. At the same time, most of our volunteers would say that they get more out of the Care Team relationship with the Partners they serve than they give.

What do you hope for the Care Team Ministry at RLC?

Naomi: We would like to get the word out and get more people involved in the ministry. For our volunteers, finding ways for the Youth to get more involved, and even families. We had a mother and daughter who visited a woman at an assisted living home. Bringing children into the lives of the older Partners helps them to stay connected. For potential Partners, or people who desire help, we encourage them to reach out; that has been a big barrier, people don't want to ask for help. They will be a blessing to others because they give the volunteers opportunities to serve.

A person might feel intimidated or concerned about fulfilling a commitment to volunteer with the team, what might you say to them?

Ken: Initially, it is little intimidating because it is new. All volunteers participate in a three hour training program that gives information about working with the typical Partner who is usually older. For example, if you are driving the Partner to an appointment, you might use a garbage bag to help that person slide into the car seat. You can start small; my wife and I began by doing visitations and serving communion for people who were shut in, and couldn't make it to services. From there, my involvement grew.

Naomi: We get training on general principles of communication, setting boundaries, honoring confidentiality. From a time perspective, it's really up to you. There is no typical commitment. You could volunteer an hour one month to drive someone to an appointment or as frequently as a weekly visit with a Partner. We try to match up volunteers and Partners in the hopes of them developing a care team relationship that evolves into a friendship. We also try to have a 2 to 1 ratio of volunteers to the people they support. Another aspect is that we are looking for more Partners; people don't want to ask for help, but they will be a blessing to others in the process.

Ken: Sometimes a particular Partnership is not a fit between two people. In those situations, once we are aware we simply make a change and try something new.

What do you enjoy most about the Care Team Ministry or do you have a favorite experience?

Naomi: It's hard to narrow down. As a volunteer I always learn something from my Partner. Those I have worked with in this capacity have incredible stories and have lived amazing lives. Being a part of their lives, even for a short time, is a great privilege.

Ken: I have really enjoyed working with veterans who served in World War II and Korea. One man was at Pearl Harbor when it was bombed; he was in counter intelligence and he talked about his experiences with that. Another man was sta-

tioned on a large ship in the South Pacific, and that ship had an ice cream machine. He described how the smaller boats in the area would come in near them to get ice cream. It's a take on history you don't get in any books.

Care Team Ministry is a joint partnership between Roseville Lutheran Church and Lyngblomsten. Any member of the congregation who has a desire to nurture a friendship and live one's faith is encouraged to join Care Team Ministry. People of all ages are welcome to volunteer. Volunteers give of their time and talents as they are able, relying on the power and support of the overall team to meet the Care Partner's needs. Care Team Ministers work on a small team where they share their time and skills with one person or family. In addition to working with Care Partners, the Care Team also arranges visitations to serve communion to those who are unable to come to service.

God calls us to be in relationship with one another. Care Team Ministry Volunteers develop lasting friendships with their Care Partners, and those friendships strengthen the fabric of the community. Volunteers also discover that in giving of their time and abilities, their own faith grows.

We have heard from people how important the Care Team is; they have praised the Care Team as one of the highlights in their experience as part of the RLC family either as Volunteers or as Partners. Please join us in thanking these Stewards of God's Love. The Power of Connection

Some of the best times to walk around the halls of Roseville Lutheran Church are on Sunday mornings at 10:10 and on Wednesday evenings at about 7:45. This is when the classrooms are filled with students and adult leaders for Cornerstone, Luther League, RAW, and Confirmation. The rooms are brimming with energy, they are overflowing with joy, they are centered in prayer and fellowship, and they are alive with vital human connection.

We recently shared a video with our confirmation small group leaders about the value and importance of human connection. (If you're interested, Google Ted Talks, Rita Pierson, and every kid needs a champion). In this video we heard these two quotes:

- James Comer said "no significant learning can occur without a significant relationship."
- George Washington Carver said "all learning is understanding relationships."

This is an important concept to grasp not just in education, but in our churches as well. We need significant relationships with other people of faith in order to really develop and delight in our own faith. We need our kids to have connections with other people of faith - that's a promise we make to them in baptism. We cannot grow and thrive in faith without the support, encouragement, and witness of others.

This is what makes a Sunday morning or a Wednesday evening walk around this church so delightfully hope-filled. Cornerstone shepherds are cheering on kids as they master memory verses. Students are laughing together and reading from their Bible together. Children and youth are asking deeply meaningful questions. There are sugary snacks being devoured, but there are also heartfelt prayers being offered. Small Group leaders are listening to the very real ups and downs in the lives of students - and then lifting their students up in prayer.

This is just a small slice of the places God is at work connecting people to people. For most families, their time at church is just an hour or two per week. There are far more hours spent at home, in the school, and in the carpool. These are all places for vital connection as well. Connecting as a family, connecting with God through prayer, connecting through the commute or carpool by turning off the radio and talking to one another. I am convinced - connections with others bring us closer to God.

What's your connection? Who do your kids or grandkids connect with? Who, besides you, is praying for your child? How are you and your family connecting with others in ways that give witness to God's love?



Secondary school students from RLC's companion congregation in Ng'ang'ange, Tanzania, will



Pastor Thanks RLC

Pastor Ajenister Maliga, in a recent letter, has thanked RLC for sponsoring her parish in Ng'ang'ange, Tanzania. We have been companion Lutheran congregations since 2002.

"Firstly let us say pray the Lord, Ng'ang'ange parish (is) so happy to say thanks for helping us in the following (ways). [...] Sponsoring 45 students by paying their school fees, whereby 12 have finished form four and five of them...will continue with advanced level in 2014/2015 and one (has) completed form six. [...] For giving us those requirements needed in Agriculture whereby we have planted one (acre) of Maize and half (an acre) of beans (using productive farming methods)."

RLC's Mission and Outreach Ministry Team is funding this agricultural education project out of our first fruits contributions to the church's annual operating budget. This demonstration plot is an excellent way for us to support the cooperative philosophy of the Bega Kwa Bega (shoulder to shoulder) program of the St. Paul Area Synod. RLC also helps the parish purchase building materials for parish projects: "Our congregation is (in) the process of building four houses for the church servants (evangelists). In July we will start constructing and preparing blocks (mud bricks) with building process."

Pastor Maliga also writes about the ways she teaches church members. In July she led a "conference for youth whereby they learn(ed) how to be economical and how to depend on God." She also led a family conference for women in September with similar goals. "Lastly children's conference (in) October whereby they can learn word from Bible with sing songs. Finally teaching all church members the benefits of praying to God. [...] Your warmly welcome to join with us: Thanks and be blessed."



Paul's Missionary Journeys

A stable, the baby Jesus in a "manger," shepherds and sheep, angels, wise men, Bethlehem, and an inn with no room. For most of us these images shape our recollection off the Christmas story. Yet in the New Testament the story of Jesus' birth appears in four very different narratives, Each of the gospels approaches the story to communicate a distinctive message for a particular audience. These two sessions will review the different ways in which the birth of Jesus is told in the gospels and highlight the way in which each story captures important aspects of this moving story.

Christmas Hymn Sing

Led by John Helgen during 10:10 Faith and Fellowship on Sunday, December 21 in the Social Hall

During the 10:10 hour on Sunday, December 21, John Helgen will lead a hymn sing. Come, request your favorite tunes for Advent and Christmas, or any time of the year and sing!

Philippians Bible Study

Led by Susan Christopherson at 10:10 Faith and Fellowship in the North Lounge, and on Wednesdays, 6:30 to 7:45 p.m., in Room 40. Runs January 4 - February 5.

Philippians, one of the most joyful letters we have from Paul, was written to his fellow Christians in Philippi. They formed the first Christian church established by Paul on European soil. Paul was writing them from prison to reassure them - his ministry continues despite his situation. He reminds them they share faith in Christ Jesus together.

Paul writes and encourages the Philippians to: be united with other Christians; live a humble life with each other; this humble life is based on the attitude Christ Jesus had; find joy in the life God has called you to - no matter what; in all things, seek to know Christ Jesus.

January 4 and 7 - GO . . . "as you discover God calls you - calls us." We begin In Acts 16 where we read: "During the night Paul had a vision of a man standing and begging him, "Come to Macedonia and help us." Paul and Silas got ready and went "concluding God has called us to go...." They traveled to Philippi in Macedonia and met a variety of diverse people who were changed by God through Paul and Silas' ministry. Gentiles (not Jews) said Paul and Silas were causing chaos. This new Philippian church, a community of faith – began in midst of all.

January 11 and 14 - Philippians 1. GO . . . "learn partnership in the gospel." Paul, in prison for Christ , "for me to live is Christ, to die is gain." Philippians 1:21. The Spirit of Jesus was with him and the Philippians supported him - in his struggles and suffering - others had selfish ambition.

January 18 and 21 - Philippians 2. GO . . . "be like minded." If there is any encouragement being united with Christ be like minded. ". . . Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus who humbled himself." Philippians 2:1-11. The Philippians were to work out their salvation in fear and trembling. It is God who works in them for his purpose. Paul recommends two friends whose lives are evidence of the "working."

January 25 and 28 - Philippians 3. GO . . . "know where your confidence is." "But whatever was my profit I now consider loss for the sake of knowing Christ Jesus." Philippians 3:7. Paul writes he will press on to take hold of that for which Christ Jesus took hold of him. Some things Paul could brag about he considers rubbish.

February 2 and 5 - Philippians 4. GO . . . "stand firm in the Lord" "and rejoice." The word for joy or rejoice is used 14 times in this letter. Paul writes whatever is about 10 times – and says "put it into practice." The Christians in Philippi had made promises, and Paul was eager they continue to follow through as they had before - again and again.
