Chapter 1: Worship: Staying Awake to Love

Ultimately, though, thinking through theology isn't the same as worshiping God. If worship doesn't dig deeper than mere intellectualism, it probably isn't a worship service. For this reason, we can't simply replace a worship service with heady conversations, podcasts about meaning, or even talks by our favorite Christian authors. A worship service, at its best, is a communal dough-kneading of your soul. There's a certain immersion to it that we don't allow ourselves to feel in any other setting. (pg. 11)

Chapter 2: Centering Marginalized Voices: Staying Awake to Empire

Racism isn't like a plane. Racism is like a moving sidewalk at an airport. (pg. 29) (Look at drawing on pg. 30)

If you walk, you head to racism. If you do nothing, that nothing consents to the moving walkway underfoot, and you head to racism. Even if you stay still and face the opposite



direction and use all the politically correct words, you're still moving toward racism, except now you feel like you're better than the other backward-facing ones... The only option you have to avoid heading into inevitable racism is to move in the other direction. Run, if you have to. (pg. 31)

Chapter 3: Prayer: Staying Awake to our Lives

When we receive things in our lives, how we hold them decides whether we will live in a landfill or a compost pile. If we hold on to them, fixate on them, become obsessed with them, then we fester, and we create landfills of our lives. But we have another option. Prayer is a chance to offer those things to God so that God can do Her thing. REleasing something to God is hard because it means that, if it's something we like, we can't exploit it anymore, and if it's something we don't like, we can't complain about it anymore. It requires trust that God can do something that we can't do. In prayer, we release our lives to God in hopes of a turnaround. (pg. 67)

Chapter 4: Groups: Staying Awake to Community

What John is trying to get at is that a human who believes that God loves them, that God is as close to them as a parent, possesses a greater capacity to love everything God made and to stay resilient in the face of the Empire. This is what Jesus means when he says, "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another" (John 13:35). In other words, by being a disciple (or follower) of Jesus, it's more likely that you will be able to show up in a loving way to the world. In this regard, the opposite of belief is not doubt but isolation." (pg. 93)
