THE NARRATIVE ARC OF OUR SHARED STORY

When one is crafting a story, we are often told to build a story arc into the narrative. This arc provides a backbone by providing a clear beginning, middle and end of the story that is being told.

The beginning is the first part of the story where the writer captures the reader's attention. A great opening line will give a glimpse into the story that is to come. And of course, like any good opening line, it will make the reader want to read more.



The middle is where the bulk of the story rests, holding the reader's attention. This is where characters are developed, conflict is introduced. A good middle should keep the reader's attention - always wanting more.

The end is where the story comes to a close and will ultimately either leave the reader satisfied with the ending, or thinking about the story long after it is finished.

The Biblical story, in its entirety, opens up with the beginning verse introducing the story of God's creation, "In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth," (Genesis 1:1)

The ending verse is found in Revelation 22:21, which reads, "The grace of the Lord Jesus be with all the saints. Amen"

There is, of course, a lot that happens between the opening line, and the closing line. This is a story of God's love for God's creation. It is a story of God's creative and redemptive work throughout the course of human history. This is a story that weaves together conflicting characters, impossible dreams, and newness on every page. While it is neatly bookended with an opening line and a closing line, it doesn't actually ever end. We haven't gotten to the ending because God's work among us is still taking shape and being formed.

BEGININGS AND ENDINGS

This past year we have reflected often on beginnings and endings. We talk about "the beginning of the pandemic," and wonder if we are truly at an "ending." We would like for our experiences to be neatly bookended - to have a place where we can say, "That story has ended, let's move on."

But human life does not work that way. Our human experience of living as God's beloved is not one arc, but rather many that are interwoven together. Much like the Biblical stories overlap and create new arcs of compassion and hope, so, too, do ours.

So, where are we in our shared story as a congregation? What began in the mid 1940's continues. Roseville Lutheran has always been called to be a presence in this community. We continue to proclaim and live out our vision and mission to "Love God. Love your neighbor." and to strive to be "A community united by grace."

This year has had its difficulties. It was a year marked by a contentious Presidential election, protests and rioting, and an unsettledness to our shared history. As a congregation, we have spent most of the year physically distanced from one another, worshiping online, gathering virtually, and, as restrictions have eased, re-entered into our past activities with hesitant steps. We have also undergone a pastoral transition as we said "goodbye and Godspeed" to Pastor Sara Spohr last July.

We have, however, lived out our vision and calling in unique and wonderful ways over the past year. We have continued to build relationships with our community partners; providing food and necessities to those who are in need. We have continued to gather as a people of God to mourn the death of our loved ones. While compassionate care looked different this year; the cards, phone calls and virtual visits were infused with the love we have for others. We have continued to explore new ways to enter into difficult conversations

regarding race and inclusion. I encourage you to read this Annual Report to fully understand the breadth and depth of our shared ministries that have continued or been born through the past year.

As we look forward to the future, we understand that God's story is still being written and created among us. There is no nice "bookend" to our shared ministry. It is passed down from one to another. It is born anew at the baptismal waters, it is born again as families gather at grave sides, it is given new life as we share a holy meal together. Wherever God's story goes, there is always, always, a new beginning.

We are living in the middle of God's story, and possibly the beginning of ours - a story that really has no end. In the Biblical story, the middle verses, found in Psalm 103:1-2 read, "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and all that is within me, bless his holy name! Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits."

May we continue to bless our Lord with all that we have, forgetting not that we, too, have a story to share.

Thank you, people of Roseville Lutheran Church, for being part of this great and tremendous story!

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TO PARTICIPATE IN GOD'S MISSION

The purpose of RLC as declared in this congregation's constitution is "To participate in God's mission..." The mistake many church people make is assuming the church exists to meet their own preferences. William Temple, a theologian and archbishop a century ago, asserted that "church is the only organization that exists solely for the benefit of non-members." That may go a step too far, but it is worth pondering. RLC exists for the sake of



the people of the Roseville area, and not just its members.

Among other things, Article IV: Purpose in RLC's Constitution reads, "the Congregation as a part of the Church shall...Serve in response to God's love to meet human needs, caring for the sick and the aged, advocating dignity and justice for all people, working for peace and reconciliation among the nations, and standing with the poor and powerless, and committing itself to their needs."

One of my responsibilities as interim associate pastor is to lead staff, council, and lay leadership in conversations about the future ministry of the congregation, focusing especially on working with a team to develop the Ministry Site Profile (MSP) for the next associate pastor call process. More than a report on RLC, the MSP is a summary of the direction that the Holy Spirit is taking this congregation. Recently members were asked to respond to a survey on a couple of sensitive topics of which RLC leadership was uncertain. Advocating dignity and justice for all people came through clearly in the responses. Over 88% affirmed "It is important that RLC actively promote racial inclusion in our church." Over 87% affirmed "I want RLC to openly welcome LGBTQ+ individuals as members of our church." These responses show a clear desire to seek dignity and justice in our racially troubled times and for those burdened by attitudes regarding gender identity. I am grateful for those on this task force: Abby Matter, Kevin Miller. Amy Schell, Chris Semsrud and Val Velde. And for those on the Inclusion Task Force who continue their work: Audrey Dontje Lindell, Wendy Neupauer, Daniel Pederson, Katrina McMahon, Linda Eldred, Trupti Storlie, Valerie Velde, Beth Jacobsen and Jill Peterson.

Another of my responsibilities is to guide the constitution update process. RLC's constitution was last updated in 2018. Since then changes in procedures and structure have been made in RLC. One of the most significant changes has been to allow official meetings to take place electronically and not solely in person. Covid quarantine has made this particularly necessary. The Constitution and Bylaws Task Force also was asked to suggest a new organizational structure for RLC that reflected its current practices and ministries. The task force gave considerable attention to what would be the best organization for the future. We are experiencing changing times. It proved impossible to envision a structure for a future that is in so much fluctuation. A different approach is needed. Rather than a static structure, RLC will, for a time, explore, experiment, and imagine various ways of organizing ministry. Essential for this approach is curiosity, willingness to make mistakes, and learn from them, allowing for wild ideas, good-sport engaging in something new, and a generous attitude of listening to those we don't usually meet. I am grateful for the Constitution and Bylaws Task Force: Chris Gehrz, Carrie Heffte Hanton, Stacy Nealy, Scott Roste, Diane Sell, Greg Johnson, KJ Bach.

It has been a pure gift to be part of RLC's ministry since November. This congregation has before it exciting opportunities! I will be serving here a few more months until the next associate pastor is called, but after I will be watching from afar to see where God is taking you.

Finally, I am blessed working with this caring, faithful, wise staff. Every one of them seeks to do what is best and right for God's mission and this church. And Pastor Lauren is a strong, gifted leader. It is a pleasure working with and learning from her.

MINISTRY SITE PROFILE TASK FORCE

The Ministry Site Profile Task Force was appointed by council to draft items for the document that will be used in the calling of a pastor called the "Ministry Site Profile." It is a formal document that describes this congregation, it's ministry direction, the characteristics of its ministry setting and the particular skills needed in the next associate pastor. The task force did this background work to assist the future Call Committee. The future Call Committee will finalize the Ministry Site Profile.

The task force assembled information on RLC that was already available, with generous assistance from RLC staff. They also researched area demographics, drawing on the Metropolitan Council Community Profile and the City of Roseville Community Development. The task force also led the survey of RLC members on key areas of which there was some uncertainty, that of racial inclusion, LGBTQ+ inclusion, and member engagement following the ending of pandemic quarantine.

While the task force work is largely completed, they will be available to the Call Committee to advise the completion of the Ministry Site Profile. Members of this task force are Abby Matter, Kevin Miller, Amy Schell, Chris Semsrud, Val Velde, and Pastor Chris Hagen.

CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS TASK FORCE

In August 2020, the Constitution and Bylaws Task Force (CBTF) was appointed by council "to align RLC's constitution and bylaws within the RLC mission, vision and values and develop a comprehensive and cohesive organizational framework that can reimagine our work as the church for the 21st century." RLC's bylaws are significantly out of date with current practices and the constitution updates have not kept up with changes from the ELCA.

The task force's work was separated into 3 categories: constitution updates, bylaw revisions, and proposing an appropriate organizational framework. Before revising bylaws, it was necessary to identify an appropriate organizational framework that the bylaws would describe. This proved to be an impossible task in the current fluid environment and still-developing church direction. Instead of a set structure, the task force decided to allow time for exploring options and experimenting with organizational forms. The bylaws reflect this open option. As for the constitution elements, the major updates have to do with the Endowment Committee and the Finance Committee.

CBTF has completed its tasks of updating the constitution and revising bylaws as far as possible. Next, RLC members will have time to review the proposed changes and ask questions. This fall the constitution and bylaws amendments will be brought to a congregation meeting for vote. Following a favorable vote, the amendments will be submitted to the St. Paul Area Synod Council for approval. Ratification of constitution amendments occurs following that approval.

ROAD CONSTRUCTION – DETOUR AHEAD

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"Road Construction – Detour Ahead." These signs are everywhere right now and they feel synonymous with my pandemic journey, one giant detour. There was no hint of an impending global pandemic when I joined Roseville Lutheran Church's executive council three years ago – I thought I knew the milestones on the path ahead of me. As it turned out, we all ended up on a detour that wasn't marked on the well-worn map from the glovebox.

Roseville Lutheran leaned into exploring new approaches to ministry and

operations this past year. Online services continued and allowed people from across the country and across the world to worship with us; creative minds stitched together virtual choirs and instrumental ensembles; other churches collaborated with us to tell the story of the Nativity in our respective parking lots; our traditional love lights moved out of the Worship Center and into our neighborhoods as luminaries; soup suppers became a weekly drive-thru event during Lent; confirmation students met and learned online; and we put our parking lot to other good uses like hosting drive-in worship and Keystone food distribution events. There was significant work happening behind the scenes, as well; Roseville Lutheran's staff collaborated more than ever, there were three active task forces, regular (and extra) Council meetings, and a host of facility updates.

All of this planning and ministry moved forward with a careful eye on the budget, and Roseville Lutheran closed out the fiscal year with an operating surplus. The main reasons for the surplus include the continued financial support from sustaining givers throughout the pandemic, a successful pRAISE RLC campaign, the forgiveness of a Payroll Protection Program (PPP) Loan, and expenses being below budget due to an extended period of online ministry. Ending the year with a surplus puts Roseville Lutheran in a strong position to return to in-person worship and ministry, continue online opportunities, and add live streaming of worship services.

As we navigated this detour together, the mission to Love God, Love Neighbor kept Roseville Lutheran on course. Our ministry continued, but some of the scenery along the way looked different; some of the experiences we shared along the detour were so special that I hope they become destinations that we revisit now and again. And as this detour concludes, I am praying for peace, rest, and rejuvenation for each of you – blessings on your continued faith journey

YOUR GENEROSITY STRENGTHENS OUR COMMUNITY

Events of the last 18 months have brought about some changes. How's that for an understatement?

Pandemic quarantine forced us to rethink every facet of our approach to worship, ministry, fellowship and outreach.

The RLC staff responded with online services, Zoom Bible studies, adult education video seminars, drive-in worship, take-home learning kits for youth

and their families, and much more. While COVID-19 restrictions hit particularly hard for those already in need, RLC teams answered with creative ways to reach out to members and to provide ongoing support of Bridging, Meals on Wheels, Keystone and other charitable efforts.

In addition to my gratitude to the RLC staff for all of their hoop-jumping, I also extend my thanks to the congregation for your patience, understanding and sustained support throughout this unprecedented time. Despite our physical separation for most of the year, you reinforced your commitment to Roseville Lutheran Church, meeting our budgeted offering total of \$1.3 million. Incredible.

Normally, RLC generates additional income through event hospitality and building fees. With these opportunities essentially non-existent last year, we faced a potentially significant income deficit. Fortunately, the RLC finance team recognized the threat, and actively pursued federal Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) funds. PPP proceeds enabled RLC to keep most of our current staff, while also filling a couple of critical new positions.

It is heartening to once again gather in person. Your continued engagement—combined with perhaps the most diversely talented staff in our over 75-year history—is helping RLC emerge from this trial stronger, and well-positioned to cultivate a community united by grace.

LOVE ONE ANOTHER

I share the feelings of so many when I simply shake my head at the past year. The stresses we all felt were certainly felt by our elders, for whom I have direct responsibility. Many in senior residences spent most of their time in their apartments with meals being delivered to their rooms. Contact with others was largely by phone. This is how pastoral care was delivered this past year. Sharing leadership of our care ministry with Diane Sell, I telephoned dozens of our elders regularly to check in and pray. Other caring RLC members did the same. It was impressive how we were able to connect from a distance. Through weekly internet devotions and recorded worship we all were able to unite in our faith, distant as we were. The Holy Spirit is not limited to a building!

Our Care Team lived out Christ's command to "love one another" through calls, notes, and distant visits. Every week our Care Team reached out to 30+ partners. Before Covid they helped with chores, shared Holy Communion, bought groceries, drove to appointments, and served as needed.

With the pandemic soon in our rear-view mirrors they are returning to these acts of love. (Sadly, with the rise of the delta variant of covid, we had to cancel our August senior brunch and worship. The meals were delivered to our elders with the love and greetings of their beloved church.)



We are grateful for the leadership of Ken Groth, Carol Solie, and Dave Risinger who organize, train, and support our 23 Care team members. Dave joined our team last spring after the retirement of Linda Hetland, for whose service we are very grateful.

Our Prayer Team, led by Pam McCulloch, supports our entire ministry. The team receives regular updates and requests which are then shared and prayed for. Pam also coordinates our prayer shawl ministry which makes shawls to share with people in special need. I serve as pastoral liaison to these teams while also having the privilege of visiting other elders in special situations.

As an additional facet of my RLC ministry I lead the Men's Breakfast and Bible Study which meets on Saturday mornings twice each month. Before Covid we averaged about 20 men each time. During the pandemic we met via zoom and usually had about 12 for Scripture study and discussion of current events and personal concerns. In the warmer months we meet outside by the tennis courts.

It is a privilege and joy to serve RLC as visitation pastor.

THE UNEXPECTED AND THE ROUTINE

This past year within the areas of Administration & Campus Management, we have worked hard to keep up with the unexpected and new as well as the routine. As the laws and regulations at federal, state, and local levels continue to change and expand, your Admin and Campus Teams have made strides to get equipped and implement solutions to achieve the dual goals of compliance and forward-moving ministry. This year's key items of note included:



- Monitoring and implementing the sometimes-daily changes brought about by COVID-19 in the areas of legal requirements, HR, and facility management.
- Maintaining our existing facility & campus.
- The work done around the Altar to keep us "Camera Ready."
- Completion of the Upper Lobby Project.
- The addition of new storage areas.
- Partnering with Roseville Area High School to administer AP testing.
- Addition of a wireless network across the Campus
- The wonderful work done by our Lively Landscapers

At the beginning of this year we reported 2,281 individuals as official members of the church. Thirty-five members were confirmed. Ten new members by baptism. Twenty-Four of our members have joined the Saints in heaven. Rounding off our total participants in worship 496 are on the roles as Friends. Together 2,777 individuals call Roseville Lutheran their faith home.

I commend to you the leadership and staff of the teams that comprise Ministry Support (non-Finance.) Bruce Pelava – Campus Manager (recently retired) and the team of Arlen Rystrom, Shelton Ingram, and Greg Saiko for keeping our facility and grounds in great shape. Connie Marchio - Hospitality Manager and Colleen Hopple (recently retired) who kept food going out the doors to the membership and those in need. Daniel Pederson - Communications Manager, and Beth Daniel – Administrative Assistant who have worked to keep you informed and connected. A very big shout out to Nick Clausen who has taken his video production knowledge to shoot and edit our recorded services as well as our current livestreaming of Worship.

WELCOME AT RLC!

Now add a global pandemic to the mix and things become really interesting. In addition to learning the landscape and trying to meet everyone, you have to do it over Zoom. And once you start to gather in person, you have to try to recognize people with half their face covered by a mask. But luckily for me, my new role was here at RLC where staff and members have shown me a warm welcome from day one!

where staff and members have shown me a warm welcome from day one! Working on our pRAISE RLC: Love Lives! campaign was a great introduction to the congregation. It was amazing to be a part of a fundraising campaign that focused on holding up and celebrating all that we are doing at RLC and in the community. I was able to attend my first drive in worship which was powerful, as well as attend the Family Fun Block Party. I enjoyed getting to meet so many people and watching as members were finally able to be together after more than a year apart. I was also moved by the generosity of the congregation as we exceeded our goal and raised a total of \$117,229. This includes:

- \$30,000 set aside for live streaming equipment
- \$3,128 raised for FMSC, which was matched dollar for dollar by generous donors
- \$14,300 spent on ionization units
- 176 total donors including 27 new donors

Thanks to your generosity and support, we are ending this year on a strong financial note. As I look towards the future, I feel hopeful about what the next year will bring. I am excited about the engagement opportunities and stewardship events we are planning to hold, as well as my expanded role on the Endowment Committee. My heart is full with gratitude for all of the many blessings I have in my life, including this new role I hold at RLC. Thank you for the warm welcome into this community united by Grace.

CONNECT

In our most recent survey, many participants indicated a desire for more activities and events to draw us together as a community. The 2021/2022 budget reflects this desire in our community engagement and fellowship: expanded Adult Education opportunities on Sunday morning, RLC's Rally and Reunion on Sunday, September 12, Block parties and Oktoberfest, to name a few.

EXPLORE

Our mission and vision statement, "Love God. Love your neighbor. A community united by grace." encourages us to find ways to explore what it means to be a people of God, not only in this day in age, but as we proclaim our faith into the future. This includes exploring ways to:

- Serve generously
- Celebrate without exception the diversity of our community
- Strive to be good stewards of the resources God has granted

In the coming year we are exploring options for: RLC Kids to participate more fully in worship, and engage in learning during our 9:00 and 10:30 a.m. worship services; a dedicated Worship leader for our 10:30 Sunday morning worship; a space in our Worship Center for young children and families to sit together; an enhanced VIBE young adult ministry that incorporates mentoring our junior and senior high youth. We are excited to discover and explore these new ways of learning and encouraging one another in our walks of faith!

ACT

One of the values we uphold in our mission and vision statement is that of faithfulness: The Lord has a purpose for us here, in Roseville. This is lived out in our commitment to working with our ministry partners locally and in the world. The budget for 2021/2022 includes raising our Mission and Outreach funds from 6% of our general offering to 7%. This increase allows us to continue our good work with our ministry partners, as well as discover new opportunities for our action.

Roseville Lutheran has served in this community since 1942. Throughout the years, our building has grown to accommodate the growing needs of the people. The building needs from which our ministries are based is also part of our budget.

- 1. The mortgage payment is now reflected in the budget (\$56,000). We anticipate that the mortgage will be paid off by April 2023. This is one area we can celebrate together as a congregation.
- 2. The organ in our Worship Center has served us faithfully over many years. There are, however, some budgeted organ repairs that are part of our 2021/2022 budget.

We can't advance our mission without you! As a ministry of the people of God for the people of God, we rely on all gifts, both large and small to shape, transform, and empower people of all ages. Throughout the month of October we will be exploring the ways our stewardship connects us with communities both local and global, as well as how we can act in thankful response to our calling and our purpose.

We invite you to participate, engage, and to prayerfully consider the ways in which you can support our shared ministries. Thank you for your gifts, support, time, and talent. I am excited to be working alongside you in our mission and ministry!

Annual reports are always a good exercise for me as a staff member because I usually am looking and planning 3 months ahead. I rarely rest in what has been, except to glean what went well and what can be done differently in the future. So now, I reflect with you on the past year.

One year ago we were in the thick of COVID, however we continued to do ministry together in Jesus'

name. We were worshiping in our parking lot. We had many volunteers working to create and continue our online Worship ministry. Close to 25 volunteers took on the role of Parking Lot attendants. We even had our first virtual Annual meeting!

As we now are open to Worship again in the building on Sundays we continue to have volunteers ushering, reading, and greeting.

We realized that our isolation from one another was especially hard on our members who were 70 and above. Our leadership took on the charge of contacting our members in this age group to let them know that they were not alone and they were being held up in prayer. Our Care Team continues to reach out today again and again. Out of this came needs. So we began

what we call our "Gift of Kindness" project that was a partnership with Hospitality and Care Ministry and began last summer. Every month meals and homemade masks went out the door to those shutin, and to those who have lost loved ones. These "gifts of kindness" then took on a new shape to include Thursday morning Donuts and Coffee to Care facilities staff last summer. We have over 12 Care facilities that our members live in and RLC volunteers delivered every week to nurses and care takers at these facilities as a thank you and a gift of kindness. This continued through the summer months in 2020.

Mission and Outreach hosted 3 events in 2020 where we partnered with Keystone to have a pack and distribution on site at RLC. Each event served over 300 family units in our community. We continued to create new events that were covid friendly and still reached out to our neighbors.

When the fall season came we continued Worship online and began finding new ways to connect with the congregation during Covid. We held our first outdoor All Saints evening service where we had over 30 people there. Other things we partnered on in ministry were the Christmas Nativity. What a gift that was!

Another way to bridge our isolation from one another was through our Lenten series "Lift Every Voice." which included an online small group study during lent. Over 125 participated in small groups weekly. In the wake of the George Floyd killing many were looking for ways to process, continue to educate, learn more, and reach out. During Holy week I was given the opportunity to flex my writing and directing muscle with 3 monologues that were delivered on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.

On June 18, our congregation held a neighborhood block party led by the team of LIT students (Leadership In Traning) from Bethel University. Under the direction of Jamey Johnson, this event was named "Drop the Mic." We had food trucks, spoken word artists, dance, and music by Reggae hip hop artist Ryan Daniels. We had over 100 neighbors and members in attendance.

My prayer for this next year is that we will not go back to how we were. My prayer is that we will be changed from the inside out by this pandemic, by this social unrest and that we, as Paul says in Romans, "never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervor, serving the Lord. Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer."

OUR NEIGHBORS AND ME



Begun as a series of six ad hoc Sunday morning discussions after the death of Philando Castile in Falcon Heights five years ago, this year ONAM found itself in step with our nationwide church. The ELCA has adopted a statement, "Strategy Toward Authentic Diversity in the ELCA," which consists of a report and recommendations regarding how the ELCA exhibits authentic diversity and formulates goals for racial diversity and inclusion.

In keeping with the ELCA churchwide goal, ONAM undertook several projects and planned for the future this past 2020-2021 year. Pastor Lauren, church staff, and ONAM members gave leadership to the viewing of "Time for Burning," viewed by youth and adults. This was followed by online discussions. The film, found on YouTube, presents the sequential story of efforts by a Lutheran pastor and church council to racially integrate their white church in Omaha during the 1960's Civil Rights era.

In August 2020 we sponsored two forums on the topic of "Civic Engagement" presented by George Shardlow and Madison Johnston. They presented the secular and sacred responsibilities of voting and political involvement. These can be found in the Forum section of the church website.

In the Fall of 2020, we continued to meet monthly online and held virtual planning meetings. Dr. Karen McKinney, Chief Equity Officer and Assistant Commissioner, Minnesota Department of Human Services, formerly Professor at Bethel University and longtime friend of RLC, consulted with ONAM leadership after the death of George Floyd to help us shape our work in the next year. Dr. McKinney will present two Sunday forums this Fall at RLC on relevant topics.

In addition the previously scheduled 2020 "Sacred Sites Tour" of Native American sites in the Twin Cities has been rescheduled for October 2. See the Fall TABLE newsletter for details of further upcoming ONAM education opportunities.

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IMMIGRATION TEAM REPORT

Nancy Olson, Immigration Team

The Immigration Team is currently a subcommittee of Our Neighbors and Me (ONAM). After one meeting in February 2020, it was sidelined for a year during COVID. Its mission is threefold: to educate the congregation about immigration issues both local and national; to advocate for congregational practices that will welcome immigrants in the church and in the community which may also include proposed state legislation; and to provide members with avenues to serve immigrant members of the community.

Starting up again in January 2021 we have:

- Developed a 3-5 year plan
- Scheduled 2 adult forums in October to further educate the congregation.
- Continued to develop of church webpages of highlighting community resources (clothing, furniture, food, education, transportation, etc.) that may assist immigrant and other families in need.
- Continued to educate ourselves on immigrant issues both national and local including the work of Lutheran Social Services
- Identified the need to increase committee size

Other fall guest speakers included Dr. Roland Martinson a Professor from Luther Seminary who spoke on the contributions of the elderly in church and society. Rollie Johnson, a lay minister from First Lutheran in Fargo, North Dakota and former member and youth leader at RLC spoke on "Finding God in the Ordinary." John Helgen and Dr. Jim Boyce entertained a conversation with Marty Haugen, a music composer and church musician. Together, the three of them provided a program on the history and evolution of music in the church overtime as well as a discussion of "music in worship" and "music parametrian" in the Lutheran Church

of January was Pastor Rolf Olson who spoke on "Gun Violence." This program was presented in cooperation with RLC's Mission and Outreach Committee. Pastor Rolf made us aware of the increase and easy access to guns and the lack

We were reminded in the opening chapters of five main points:

WE ARE BLESSED... BECAUSE WE SURVIVED!

RLC Preschool and Childcare staff and families are very grateful we were able to be open during most of the pandemic. At times, we felt we had a bubble around us, protecting us because we had no Covid-19 cases that affected us to shut down. Yes, we took a risk being open, but we (the staff of the preschool and childcare) felt we had an essential service and care we needed to provide to our families and



community. And our families were more than appreciative of this service, as was shown to the staff during Teacher Appreciation week in May. Cards, gifts, balloons, and more were given to the staff to say "thanks." But most of all each day was a blessing, as we heard at least one parent say, "Thanks for being open, I don't know how our family could have done it without you!"

So, how did our preschool and childcare survive? We followed our Covid-19 guidelines thoroughly from the CDC, MN Dept. of Health, and MN Dept of Human Services. This meant staff, parents, and children wore masks, we washed hands (A LOT!)/or used Hand Sanitizer, did temperature/symptomatic checks each day, cleaned our toys and equipment daily if not hourly, and had ionizing units to purify the air. The preschool also changed how they did check-in and check-out by having families enter in the upper lobby (instead of using the preschool entrance) and having teachers meet the students and escort them to the rooms. By not having parents escort them to their classroom allowed for less people entering the classroom, and not as many people being in a confined space. Plus, we learned that children under the age of 5 had a lower risk of transmission, along with having lower classroom sizes for both the preschool and childcare helped the programs. The lower numbers did hurt us financially, but we were blessed to receive some MN State grants to aide in covering some of our costs.

Then mid-year preschool and childcare staff received news that we qualified to get vaccinated in a Pilot Program for the Covid-19 vaccine. Hallelujah! The teachers were so excited to receive this vaccine. It was such a gift to receive. For many of the staff it was like a huge weight had been lifted and a new energy was given.

Going forward this school year, the preschool and childcare have learned from the Governor, that the mask mandate and peacetime emergency has been lifted. This allows the preschool and the childcare programs to resume to a more "normal" environment as we did prior to the pandemic.



However, we will still have a Covid-19 policy in place for reference, masks will be optional, and we found we liked some of our Covid-19 changes due to the health and safety aspect, that we will continue to use them. In addition, the preschool will continue the check-in and check-out system in the upper lobby, because it was not only safer, but the children had less separation anxiety.

The other tool that helped us survive this year was purely our faith. Through songs, prayers, and praise we are thankful we survived, yet we are more blessed that we could continue to serve the children and their families in our childcare and preschool programs.

Thanks again to everyone in our congregation and families in our programs who have supported us in our fundraisers (i.e. Poinsettia Sale and Spring Plant Sale), as well as spiritually. The Preschool will continue these fundraisers this next year! We appreciate you helping us plant the seed of faith in our young students.

SUNDAY MORNINGS ARE GOING TO LOOK DIFFERENT THIS FALL

A Note from Julie Hanson, Director of Children's Ministry

Before we had to shut down programming in March 2020, many parents told us that being at church for over 2 hours each Sunday, attending both worship and Sunday school was just too long of a time commitment. To address this challenge, we are offering RLC Kids on Sundays at two different times during Worship, at 9:00 or 10:30. Parents will choose which service they will most likely attend and register their children for RLC Kids at that time.

Preschool and Kindergarten kids will be be with Ms. Gena for the whole hour, breaking into small groups after they sing songs and hear the story. 1st-6th graders will start in worship with their families and leave after Storytime, to reinforce the message they just heard in worship, in Large group. Older kids will dig into their bibles, younger kids will sing and praise God together. The kids will then re-join their families in worship toward the end of the service. This will give kids the opportunity to participate in communion, baptisms and prayer with their family. Worshipping together as a family is an important part of our faith. While the Sunday School time apart from worship is much shorter, the whole experience of worship and RLC Kids time will be more meaningful.

We are going to offer other special times together for parents to connect and kids to play and get to know their new friends. We will continue to offer a Dresser Build and Kitchen Bundle event, as well as other service projects on Sundays. Lunch Bunch will be offered periodically, where kids bring a sack lunch and stay after the 10:30 service to eat together, play games and generally socialize. Parents can then either stay and connect with one another, run errands, or have brunch themselves.

Wednesday night is church night! Starting in October, we are inviting families to join us for a simple meal and Family Blessing service. Dinner will be served and as families eat around their tables the pastor will give a short recap of their message. We will have activities for the families to do that reinforce this message, along with a service component. Families will need to register for the meal to ensure we have enough food. A free will offering will be asked.

It is going to be a challenge get up from the couch and actually get out the door on a Sunday. It has been a very stressful year and very challenging in a lot of ways! If you can't make it on Sunday, maybe Wednesday night works for you!

As we begin to gather together again our hope is that we can be more meaningful and intentional with what we do. We walk together with you to help kids grow in their faith, and as such want to support parents in any way we can. We have missed seeing you, and look forward to seeing you this fall!

LIVELY LANDSCAPERS

The 'Lively Landscapers' team was initiated in early 2020 to tend to the RLC gardens. There was much to be done as the gardens had not been tended to in earnest for a few years. It took many volunteer hours to simply cleanup up and trim up the existing gardens. Here are the highlights of the Lively Landscapers efforts in the summer of 2020 and Spring 2021:

The Roselawn Ave Rain Gardens were completely renovated. The City of Roseville hired Outdoor Lab Landscapers to tend to City owned gardens. With the help of the Lively Landscapers, the Rain Gardens native plantings bloomed beautifully!

25 yr old Arborvitae, overgrown and unattractive, were removed from the west side of the South Commons entrance. Tulips and other perennials were planted and the area mulched. What a difference this made to now SEE the entrance to Commons and be greeted by colorful plantings.

The South Parking Lot islands got a start to having ornamental grass, day lilies and sedum planted to help break up the asphalt and concrete expanse. More islands will get renovated as funding is available.

With the Arborvitae removed from the South Entrance, the large utility boxes were a bit of an eye-sore. The boxes were painted to help camouflage them, but also, a used cedar fence was installed. The materials were donated by Roseville Auto Repair as their backyard fence was being replaced. A yardwaste bin was built by the Child Care House garage using more of the donated fencing. Thanks, Roseville Auto Repair for providing this material.



In Spring 2021, 20 cubic yards of mulch was delivered and with a couple of afternoons of volunteers with wheelbarrows, the South Slope & Terrace area to the west of the Commons entrance and the North Slope of the Worship Center were re-mulched! Free mulch has also been retrieved from county compost sites for many other smaller areas.

The Lively Landscapers used Thrivent Action Team Grants to fund their startup costs. Volunteers purchased plants themselves, but many plants have also been donated by various RLC members and even RLC neighbors.

As we turned to the fall season in September 2020, the musicians of Roseville Lutheran remained on hiatus due to the restrictions brought on by the global health pandemic. No rehearsals or performances for choirs, bell groups, brass ensemble, worship ensembles, or the jazz band. As the fall progressed, it became clear that worship would

continue to be held only online, that there'd be no Christmas Festival concert, no New Year's Eve jazz concert, and all the outside performing groups that use RLC for concerts cancelled their events. We realized we'd need to hold our worship services for Advent and Christmas online. And



by the end of the year, we knew that the situation was going to extend well into 2021 and affect our worship services for Lent, Holy Week and Easter, and beyond.

We continued with our production of weekly videos for worship, videotaping liturgy, readings, storytime, sermons, prayers, and music every Tuesday in preparation for the upcoming Sunday. Pastor Lauren coordinated the preaching and assisting minister schedules, Diane Sell the readers, Julie Hanson was in charge of storytime, Nick Clausen shot and edited the video, Jeff Bowar did the audio recording, and John Helgen coordinated and led the musicians. Thanks to all the many people that served as readers, leaders, musicians, or gave other assistance to make all this happen!



Fun highlights from the year were our production of two special "music videos" – the first was a performance of "Night of Silence/Silent Night" which aired as part of our Christmas Eve worship, and involved numerous singers along with brass, strings, handbells and percussion. Then, in May 2021, we released a performance of "Let Us Talents and Tongues Employ" as part of the "pRAISE RLC" campaign, which featured vocalists, multiple percussion instruments, and a cadre of enthusiastic young dancers!

As the winter came to an end, we were happy to be able to hold drive-in services in the church parking lot for Palm Sunday and Easter, broadcasting on FM radio to the cars of those attending. Palm Sunday featured a festive palm parade led by bagpipes and drum, and on Easter Sunday the RLC brass ensemble joined with the worship band to lead the music. The drive-in services have continued on the first Sunday of each month through the summer.

A big initiative during this pandemic-constricted year has been our preparations to create the capability to live-stream worship services on the internet (as well as community television.) Now that we are getting back to in-person worship, people will be able to watch the worship service "live" online, and also later at a time of their choosing, from the archive on the church website. This will require both equipment - video cameras, control units for the cameras, a control room for equipment and production, lots of wiring, and people to run it. Having this capability is important for RLC's future, as we seek to reach out to members who are not physically able to attend in-person on Sundays, due to restrictions from health, work, travel, weather, family, etc. The ability to live-stream also enables people to participate in our worship services from remote locations and at different times. As we go forward, we hope to expand our capabilities for livestreaming to include education events, concerts, conferences and other productions.

So, as we turn to the fall of 2021, we remain hopeful – hopeful that we will be able to resume our usual musical activities in the way we love to do them. Roseville Lutheran has been richly blessed by the gifts of its many musicians, who participate in the choirs, handbell choirs, worship ensembles and bands, the brass ensemble, and the jazz band. We look forward to their return to our worship life.
