In a recent article in The Christian Century, by professor and writer Brian Bantum, entitled "Still Plowing," (July 1, 2020, pg. 35), Bantum begins his article with these words,

"I have been thinking a lot about Moses, about bondage and liberation and what it looks like

to imagine one's life apart from the lens of an oppressive regime. Somehow, Moses is drawn from a space of death into privilege, then into the wilderness, and then into the throes of a liberation movement. It's all miracles and power and bags full of gold – until he and the Israelites hit that watery obstacle and hear Pharaoh's army behind them."

We are pretty familiar with the story. Moses and the Israelites have been allowed to leave the slavery they knew in Egypt. They quickly pack up their things, a few bags of gold, and set out to freedom. Pharaoh, however, has second thoughts and soon sends his army out to bring the slaves back to his land. The Israelites are caught with the Red Sea in front of them and their would-be captors behind them.

The Israelites begin to complain. In Exodus 14:11-12 they call out,

"Was it because there were no graves in Egypt that you have taken us away to die in the wilderness? What have you done to us, bringing us out of Egypt? Is this not the very thing we told you in Egypt, 'Let us alone and let us serve the Egyptians'? For it would have been better for us to serve the Egyptians than to die in the wilderness.'"

It is a cry of lament. On the brink between captivity and freedom, they are lamenting the safety of the comfort of the past – even though that past was one of slavery and bondage. In this moment, the thought of freedom, liberation and a land to call their own seemed like a lot of work, dangerous work, hard work. In this moment they don't quite feel up to the task to move into the future.

As I consider the world around us, sometimes I look back on the past and long to return to those seemingly halcyon days of past years. Looking back to those years, I can find myself waxing nostalgic about how it used to be, forgetting that it wasn't all idyllic and happy.

Stepping into the future and claiming a future is hard and arduous work. It is sometimes dangerous work. It is sometimes unsettling work. But it is the work of a people of God who center themselves first and foremost in the love and keeping of a generous God.

There on the shores of the Red Sea, Moses does not cry out for his people to start getting busy

arming themselves, building a wall, or running for the hills. As the people cry out their lament, Moses speaks to them and says, "The Lord will fight for you, and you have only to keep still."

Bantum continues,

"Keep still? They should probably be walking. But there is another meaning to still here: to plough or engrave. It's not inactivity, but a directed, purposeful movement. Moses wants them to walk into their liberation. At this moment it's not a question of what they should do **but of who they are. Be still, God says. Plough, dig, plunge your hands into the ground and feel what gives you life...** Be still and feel the center of your being and how it cries out not for the toil of Pharaoh but for worship and life with your Creator." (emphasis mine)

And then, Moses ploughs his staff into the ground and God reveals the promises and possibilities of freedom that were there the entire time.

The future is before us and we, too, share in this work of ploughing and digging, unearthing the promises of God that have been there since God first breathed into the earth and created life. We are reminded to feel the ground beneath us, to stand still in the promise of God's love and keeping, and step forward into uncharted ground together, led by the spirit and fed by God's promises.

This is holy ground that we stand on. This is holy work that we are a part of.

In the closing, Bantum writes, "We choose to be life, in all its stubborn and mundane forms. We choose to drive our staff into the ground and see what God will do, what paths of liberation might be revealed."

As we move forward in these unprecedented times, we are not just "standing still" we are plunging deeply into that which gives us life. We choose to be life and see what God will do and what liberation will be revealed.

I am thankful for all of you. Your work, your steadfastness during these difficult times, your hope and the ways in which we, as a people of God, are plowing new ground. Thanks be to God!



Families made 100 tie blankets for clients of Bridging, and we collected hygiene items for Keystone Community Services.

Bonus prizes were given out in some of the camp boxes – gift cards to Target, Michaels, Barnes & Noble and Dairy Queen were some of them, in addition to the weekly Photo Challenge prizes!

CONFIRMATION 2020-2021

With Roseville Lutheran's decision to not open in the fall came the reality that confirmation could not take place in its original form (at least not immediately). Therefore, confirmation will be online on Wednesday nights at 7 p.m. but will be 45 minutes to an hour instead of the traditional hour and a half. We will begin with Orientation on Wednesday September 23rd. It will be very important for both students and parents to attend this online session as I will be outlining the multitude of changes that will happen as a result of Covid-19.

We will still be asking students to register online! Please have your child registered by September 1st. At the time of registration, we require a fee to help cover the costs of supplies. This year, as a result of the pandemic, we decided to lower the price to \$60 per student. It will likely return to \$75 next year, but during these challenging times, we want to take a little financial stress off your while still being able to run a high-quality program. I am looking forward to this year, whatever it ends up looking like. All I ask of you is patience and grace and I happily plan to return those to you as well. The year is planned out, but specifically what everything will look will likely change. I will do my

TANZANIAN STUDENT SCHOLARSHIPS

A Global Outread Ministry of RLC

For over fifteen years RLC has faithfully provided scholarship support for secondary school students from RLC's companion congregation in Ng'ang'ange, Tanzania. In 2020, church leaders at Ng'ang'ange awarded more than 50 students with scholarship support from RLC. Our Mission and Outreach Ministry Team's goal is to maintain this ministry, enabling new highpotential students to enter school and successful students to continue their education in 2021.

Most of these students attend secondary schools but a few of them attend either a vocational school or a university or a seminary in Tanzania. RLC has also pledged to help sponsor a Tanzanian student at Luther Seminary right here in St. Paul this school year! The majority of all these scholarship recipients are members of the Ng'ang'ange parish.



Need Continues During Pandemic

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, all Tanzanian schools were closed in mid-March. However, primary and secondary students returned to school on June 28. In the Iringa Diocese, the students wear masks and wash hands frequently. Their temperatures are taken each day. In Tanzania the school year follows the calendar year, but the two school terms have been adjusted to make up for the time lost this spring.

During previous visits to Ng'ang'ange by RLC members, the parish leaders told us that the education of their young people is their highest priority. Through the Bega Kwa Bega program of the Saint Paul Area Synod, we are able to extend RLC's outreach ministry abroad to support these fine young Lutherans.

You Can Help - Give Now, Through November 1

Here is how you can personally join this vital outreach ministry. Prayerfully consider providing student scholarship funds yourself for the 2021 school year that starts in January. To do so simply send a check to the church office and designate your gift by writing "Tanzania Scholarship" in the memo line. Or you can donate online by texting amount-scholarship TZ to 651-383-1504. The deadline for receiving these scholarship funds is November 1, 2020.

Individual scholarships are based on need, and vary from student to student. The average award is about \$380. Partial or multiple scholarship donations will all be consolidated by Bega Kwa Bega and sent to Tanzania this November. Church leaders there will then have the funds they need to award next year's scholarships.

We at RLC are blessed to have this unique and inspiring companion

congregation relationship with Lutherans in far-away Tanzania. We can learn so much from each other on both sides of the ocean, not only about our common faith, but also about our individual hopes and dreams. Together we become a global community united by grace through prayer and a deeper understanding of each other.



Your Feedback Informs Phased Re-Entry.


In July we invited you, as members and friends of Roseville Lutheran Church, to participate in an online survey so that we could hear how you are doing, how you have stayed engaged at Roseville Lutheran Church during the pandemic, and what your thoughts are at this time regarding when you would feel comfortable in engaging in on-site ministry at Roseville Lutheran in the future.

Over 191 families and individuals participated in the survey with ages ranging from 13 - 85+. Here are some of the results of the survey.


During the pandemic I have participated in weekly online worship:




When would you feel comfortable attending an indoor, in-person worship service? (Note: the "striped area" represents various individual responses to this question.)

When would you feel comfortable volunteering on campus? (Note: the "striped area" represents various individual responses to this question.)



Other responses indicate many of you feel it is very important that, as we move forward with in-person worship, that we follow protocols for wearing masks and physical distancing, provide hand sanitizer, and eliminate fellowship time.

For those who have children or youth in our Children's, Youth and Family Programs, your response to the question **"When would you feel comfortable with them attending programming?"** indicate a strong desire to follow the guidelines offered by local schools in the area.

Of the 74 responses to this question:

- 43%: after schools are open
- 20%: when a vaccine is widely available
- 13%: when stay-safe orders are lifte
- 3%: unknown

We recognize that this survey only provides a "snapshot" of your concerns and feelings at one moment in time. There is still much that the health community is learning about Covid-19, and we continue to listen to the advice of local and national health experts as they provide guidance for moving forward.

PHASED RE-ENTRY PLAN

At the time of this writing (late July, 2020) Roseville Lutheran is currently operating at Level 2 and working towards Level 3. One of the ways in which we are moving forward with Level 3 is offering in-person worship once a month, on the third Sunday of the month, starting in September 2020. We are working towards moving forward with different elements of Level 3 throughout the fall and winter of 2020. (See the Phase Table lower on this page.)

A reminder of the what **LEVEL 2** and **LEVEL 3** look like and the type of on-campus activity:

Activities On Site

- Staff begin normal office hours, as able.
- Attention to cleaning and physical distancing
- . Recording of worship continues for online streaming
- Cleaning of facilities on a regular basis for spaces used
- Bible studies and small groups may meet in person while maintaining physical distancing and mask wearing guidelines Approval required. Online options will continue.
- Groups, teams and committees may meet in person. Approval is required.
- Preschool and child care follows CDC, MDH and MN DHS guidelines for opening

There is much that we do not know as we look into the future of this pandemic. There may be times when we go back to "Level 0" where all ministry is held online and there may be times when we operate under two different levels, depending on how Covid-19 is impacting our community. (For example: we feel comfortable with having in-person worship, but Children's, Youth and Family ministry is held online only)
